Eyewitnesses of the fire, Samuel Pepys and John Evelyn wrote diaries describing what happened.

drought	A period of low rainfall, making it very dry

fire breaks	A gap that stops fire spreading to nearby buildings
fire hooks	Long pole with a hook, used to pull down walls and ceilings

Key Events



Sunday 2nd September 1666 Around 1am the fire started in a bakery on Pudding Lane. It spread quickly.



Tuesday 4th September 1666 The fire reached its peak. St Paul's Cathedral was destroyed.



Monday 3rd September 1666 The fire blazed through the south of the city. People tried to escape.







Thursday 6th September 1666 The last of the flames were eventually put out.



Wednesday 5th September 1666 The wind died down and the fire lost strength.
